Marti was married in 1969 at the age of 25. She and her first husband were married for 10 years, and they had one son, Rob, who became an attorney. Rob had two sons, Adam and Connor. Marti's husband was a doctor, and they moved around a great deal, as he completed his residencies. After this marriage, Marti attended Mt. St. Mary's College in LA, and finished her Bachelor's and RN degrees. She then worked in a hospital for three years.

The next chapter of Marti's life began when she met her second husband, Merlin, who she married in 1984. She met Merlin in Ventura, California. He was introduced to her by her sister and brother-in-law, who owned a sailboat, and was Merlin's friend. Merlin had three children, Tammi, Randall and Vance. 

Marti talks about the wonderful times they had on the Columbia and Willamette rivers, fishing and sightseeing. She says it is so wonderful to see the countryside from the river; you get such a different perspective. Marti said Merlin really enjoyed taking people on his boat and sharing the experience and his skills with them. She also mentioned that their granddaughter Casey enjoyed traveling with them and they really enjoyed her company too. Marti reminisces about their travels all across the United States in their RV with the other like-minded couples they had met.
