When asked if any of her siblings were in attendance, Fern sadly replied that she was the only one surviving of the 12 children. Lyle enjoyed having his remaining sister at the event, who had great fun seeing many people she had known when she was younger. The couple said it was heartwarming to see the younger set enjoying themselves so much.

Fern was one of twelve children, raised on her parents' property in Hopewell, where the entire family worked hard raising cane berries. This is particularly interesting to me, because the family eventually sold the property to the Wilbanks family, and I can say first hand that the Wilbanks family were another hardworking bunch! Lyle and Fern were farmers for most of their lives, and Lyle eventually retired from farming when he was 77 years old.

The couple reminisce about their travels in their fifth wheel after they retired, and their travels to Europe and England. Lyle's aunt Amber did some family research which revealed a connection to a wealthy family who owned Rushton Hall, the ancestral home of the Tresham family in Northamptonshire, making their time in England especially meaningful. Aunt Amber also produced a comprehensive book from information found in an English library. The Treshams are very proud to be able to pass their heritage on to their six grandchildren, seven great grandchildren, two step grandchildren, and five step great grandchildren. As lifetime members of Yamhill County, the Treshams know many people, and seem to have found their piece of heaven at ValleyView/Rock of Ages.
