She attended grade school and the first two years of high school in Sheridan. The last two years were



spent at Western Mennonite (now Western Christian). After graduation she attended Chemeketa and took courses in accounting, which served her very well. She loved that work, and was able to find work throughout her life in that field. Her first job was with Stuck Electric in Sheridan, where she stayed for approximately 25 years. She had been a babysitter for that family while she was in school, so it was a natural transition. She also mentioned that the Stuck family trained her well while on the job in her accounting/bookkeeping career.

After spending 25 great years in Sheridan with Stuck Electric, Marlys was asked to come and be bookkeeper for Gospel Echoes Prison Ministry headquartered in Goshen, Indiana. She spent five years there and found it very rewarding. Marlys had an opportunity to see positive work that was being done by the organization.

By the time Marlys decided to return to Sheridan, her father had lost his eyesight. She lived with them for a while and helped out until she purchased her house in Sheridan, which had been previously owned by her aunt. Marlys found her next (Yoder continued pg 3)

If you do fall, strength training will make you less likely to break a bone. Working out with resistance bands or weights or doing resistance exercises makes your bones denser and therefore stronger. Women's exercise classes meet Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 9:30 AM. Our gym is available for workouts on your own anytime. You can also consider a water aerobics class.

Recently, a fun evening was had by nearly fifty folks as we worked together to prepared 250 Hygiene kits at the Rock of Ages Activity Center. The group included residents, staff and some folks from the Sheridan Mennonite and Sunrise churches. We started out with pizza and ice cream and then we went to work. The kits included soap, shampoo, comb, toothpaste and brush, fingernail clipper, underarm deodorant, along with washcloths all wrapped in a bath towel. The kits will be sent to Lebanon families in the Middle East. Christian Aid Ministries (CAM), an Ohio based organization, provided the contents of the kits and the CAM NW Director, John Smucker, was here to train us how to put the kits together. The kits that were prepared here at Rock of Ages will join others and will be shipped in a filled container in November. It was a great time working and having fun together.

There were two assembly lines, each manned by 10 to 15 people on either the supply or assembly sides. The process began by spreading out a bath towel at station I.





At station II, a handkerchief and a tube of toothpaste were added, and so on continuing down the line.







When the towel reaches the end of the assembly line, the assembly is inspected to make sure it has all the items and then folded over tightly and passed to the final station where the bundle is closed with three safety pins and stacked in a box for shipping.



Supply Side folks made sure all the items needed to keep the process moving along were ready. All 250 kits were completed in one hour.

What Does NOT Go in the Red Recycle Can by Jan Noland

Recology Western Oregon is the recycler/ garbage hauler for Rock of Ages. You see their green and white trucks here on Fridays. Recology is asking that you **NOT** put the



following in red containers or your recycle bin:

-Any type of plastic bag or Styrofoam of any kind -Plastic food containers, like what comes from the

dining room or take-out foods. -Snack food bags (like chips) or candy wrappers -Plastic drink cups, silverware and straws -Any food residue or container that has food residue (like pizza o n it boxes) Kleenex, paper -Napkins, towels, -Attends, diapers, or other such personal items

Please DO recycle the following in the red can or your driveway bin:

-Newspapers, magazines, junk mail -Cardboard, if possible, break it down -Plastic tubs (like yogurt tubs) and; bottles that

have a screw off lid (milk jugs, detergent bottles. Item must be larger than a tennis ball. -Clean, rinsed out, tin and aluminum cans and bottles

Items that go in the red can should be empty, clean and dry.

Many plastics that go in the garbage can be recycled through a special once-a-quarter program. Talk to Jan Noland if you would like more information.

You can recycle your 10 cent Oregon glass, plastic and aluminum bottles and cans in the collection can at the lodge kitchen back door, or in the tub outside Bruce & Shirley Hamilton's door. Bruce will take it all to the Western Christian School as part of their fund raising program.
